<p>From April 25<sup>th</sup> to May first, I participated in Kozima practice. Kozima is well known to the beginning place of Japan primatology and 96 individuals live in this island. The purpose of this practice was to experience a research activity for wild primates, including planning, collecting data, data analysis and presentation. In this practice, I studied about escaping behaviors, particularly about direction and places they use in escaping. In direction of escaping, the ratio of “peripheral” was higher than “central” and significant difference between times was not seen. And in places in escaping, the ratio of “outside” of provisioning area was higher than “inside” and also significant difference between times was not seen. Through this practice, I learned importance of statistical analysis. Before starting data collection, I should think how I will analyze data I will have collected. With that point of view, I want to conduct future study.</p>
