<p>During this visit, I conducted research on Yakuzaru monkeys. Our team looked for Yakuzaru along the road and analyzed the relationship between their distribution and elevation or vegetation.</p> <p>When we observe monkeys directly, hear their vocalization or see their feces, we call it “detection”. It was confusing when I found many feces in small area because it is really difficult to know they are dropped out by a same monkey at the same time. But I learned that it is important not to take much time on discussing just one rare case. And I realize that taking some pictures to explain others is necessary.</p> <p>Our result shows that there are more monkeys when there is wooden environment. Our results also suggest that places near the villages have less monkeys.
