<div style="display: flex; justify-content: space-between;"> <div style="width: 45%;"> <p>This trip was aimed to join the exhibition “School of Fieldwork 2017” in the Mountain Forum at Matsumoto Performing Arts Centre. In this forum, there were a lot of exhibitions related to mountaineering or outdoor activities. Just going around and seeing them was a lot of fun. Among them, a short lecture on the first aid for injured person was especially interesting.</p> <p>Our exhibition consisted of displays from Japan Monkey Centre (JMC), introduction of feral horses at Portugal, a cognitive experiment of chimpanzees, and ropework activity. Compared with Kids Jamboree at Tokyo, I felt that more adults visited our booth. I mainly talk about chimpanzees or ropework. Chimpanzee individual identification game, in which a visitor held a card of a chimpanzee and searched the same chimpanzee in the panel, was difficult for me (Fig.1), but children seemed to enjoy the game.
