Her story of letting the world know chimpanzees and of the conservation work was very encouraging. Now Dr. Goodall "walked out" from the photos, and I was so fortunate to listen to her telling the contagious stories, which was even more inspiring.

In ICP and in Kyoto seminar, Dr. Goodall talked about the Chicago meeting that changed her life. She gave up he "gorgeous life" and devoted to conservation work all over the world, because that was the time when bush meat and animal trading started to get serious. After her talk, there was a hot discussion among the audiences. I learned a lot from Dr. Goodall's great talk and from the communication with other people. It was a wonderful experience.
